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Afternoon Session.—The Message of the Governor was received and read in both Houses. It was listened to with deep attention in the House. There will unquestionably be a diversity of opinion upon his views on the important topics discussed in the message.

The message has pointed out in a strong but true light, the effects of our Internal Improvement System, conducted upon party principles, and designed to secure party objects.

After the address was read, an attempt was made to authorize the printing of 10,000 copies. This was resisted and defeated. Another was made in favor of the printing of 8,000 copies. This, too, was defeated.

After the message was read, the Governor sent a communication to the House from Gen. Gaines of the U. S. Army, proposing a system of Railroads to be constructed by the General Government for the military defence of the nation.

On the 11th ult., the loyalists of Montreal made a general confederation of all the dwellings and property of the patriots in and about that city. Not a house was left standing.

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
