

Washington, Jan. 6. 1849.

Friend Miller:

Your letter in relation to the Post office at Jacksonville, is received. I do not know, as yet, whether Mr. Hoagy will be removed, nor if he shall, whether I shall be permitted to name the person to fill the vacancy. If, however, this responsibility shall fall upon me, I shall, ^{have} no motive in the exercise of it, other than to oblige the good and intelligent people of Jacksonville, and vicinity. And if, with all the lights before me, when the time comes, their preferences shall seem to be for you, I shall be most happy to gratify both them and you. Yours is the first letter I have had in relation to that office.
