Dear Sir:

I beg you not to attribute my delay in answering your note to any lack of interest. After the close of the campaign I had so many duties pressing upon me prior to my leaving home, that I thought best to wait answering you till my arrival here. Sicknes<sup>s</sup> delayed me a few days on the way, & I now embrace the first opportunity, since my arrival to write you.

I may say, I think, with confidence, that amongst the Whigs of my district, you are

the decided choice. But the delegations, are a good deal mixed so far as old party designations go, though all anti Nebraska. Stevens of Kansas is an old fashioned Whig. A plain sensible man, I think you had better write him a kind letter. Residens Womence. I meant to have seen him, but could not. I talked with Cralfield his Postman & neighbor, & he assured me Stevens would be all right. Judge Parkes of Joliet, is a Democrat, but anti Nebraska, anti Pierce, anti Doug las, & anti Shields. of Whig predictions, and I

him to stop his clamor.


The weather is fine, & the health
