He could no longer remain silent without being compelled to answer awkward questions from the more honest and truthful of his own political associates, and therefore he has done his best to forestall inquiry by a resort to the old game of pleading a series of false isues.

The "Degradation of Labor" is the formida ble caption of the article in question. The writer must have credit for boldness if not for honesty. He takes the bull by the horns by declaring first of all that the Democratic party has never in any way interfered, as a party, with the subject of slavery, and "is not in favor of its extension." Pretty cool this for a man who, at the suggestion of Atchison, proposed the repeal of the Missouri Compromise, and who with his party justifies all the lawless atrocities of the ruffians to force slavery into Kansas in defiance even of the provisions of the Kansas-Nebrasks act. But enough on this point. The bare quotation of the assertion is its refutation.
